Over 40 market vendors from Waigani Market have been up-skilled through a two-day financial literacy training by qualified professionals from the Women's Micro Bank and Digicel Cell Moni.

The training is a crucial part of NCD Governor's initiative to support and empower SMEs in the city through the NCD SME Service Centre. The vendors, who received their certificates, were the first beneficiaries of the programme and operate in the informal sector.

Governor Parkop made a pledge of K20,000 to the Waigani Vendors Association, stating that he is confident that they have the potential to become PMV owners, shop owners and running SME businesses in Port Moresby.

Vendors expressed their gratitude and appreciation for the first-of-its-kind training in the market. Grace Kubuni said, "Most of us are semi-literate and are unemployed but yes we do make money every day at the market. This training has made us realized how important it is to save money and also directed us to who we can go to seek help."

In the next few months, the Governor and the National Capital District Commission will further drive the SME programme in other parts of the city.
